



A comparison between At-Sea Monitors and Northeast Fisheries Observers

This table will help describe the difference between the At-Sea Monitoring Program (ASM) monitors and Northeast Fisheries Observer Program (NEFOP) Observers. Both programs are developed and overseen by NMFS Fisheries Sampling Branch at the Northeast Fisheries Science Center (NEFSC). The main difference between the two is that monitors will be collecting a reduced set of data, thereby reducing training time, gear requirements, and internal support resources.

NEFOP observers and ASM monitors are trained by the NEFSC. Data collected by both programs are processed by the NEFSC. Observers and monitors identify and record all species caught, are trained in sub-sampling methodology, and receive advanced training in vessel safety.

Listed below is a table highlighting the differences between the ASM monitors and the NEFOP observers.
